

CHANGING PLACES: Installation of fittings in the Changing Places accessible change room and toilet at Four Kings car park is complete.

The facility is being operated and maintained by project partner Great Ocean Road Coast Committee and will open for use once Changing Places accreditation is approved.

Changing Places have an adult-sized change table, ceiling hoist and enough space for people with high physical needs, and their carers. People with high support needs access Changing Places using a specially issued key.

Changing Places are listed on a national register, helping people with high physical needs access essential facilities. Importantly, our Anglesea facility will help expand travel horizons.



FOREST ROAD: Final sealing of new shoulders on Forest Road between Gum Flats and Nortons roads will be completed during December.

The project will improve road safety, with widening and sealing of 2km of road shoulders, improved line marking and signs. Guardrails and signage will also be installed.

The \$500k project is fully funded by the Australian Government Black Spot Program and administered by Regional Roads Victoria.



FOREST AND GRAYS ROADS: Council has recently completed shoulder widening, pavement strengthening and guardrail installation on a total of about 4km of Grays Road and Forest Road.

The work was jointly funded by Council and the Victorian Government's Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program.

ELLIMATTA RESERVE: Construction of a new 32-space car park beside netball courts at Ellimatta Reserve is continuing on schedule.

The \$195,325 project was successful in the Victorian Government's Pick My Project community grants initiative and will improve safety for reserve users.

Earthwork and surfacing of the car park is scheduled for completion by mid-March.

Upgrading of lighting for the adjoining oval to 150 lux is complete and ready for launch early in 2020.

Sport and Recreation Victoria contributed \$100,000 for the \$280,000 lighting project, Surf Coast Shire Council \$165,000 and Anglesea Football Netball Club \$15,000.

The higher quality lighting will enable use of the full ground for training and night games, and support growth of women's and children's programs.



AFTER-HOURS WASTE DROP-OFF: Installation of motion-sensing lighting has improved safety at Anglesea's after-hours waste drop-off site.

The depot, at the old entrance to Anglesea landfill, provides for people to drop off bags of domestic waste after hours.

Installation of closed circuit cameras has also enhanced safety, monitoring activity around the clock as well as helping to identify people illegally dumping material.
