




ANGLESEA TRANSFER STATION: The station's new e-waste depot is now operating, providing a covered space for people to drop e-waste items free of charge.

E-waste includes any item with a plug, battery or cord that is no longer working or wanted. In July 2019 the Victorian Government banned placing of e-waste in kerbside bins or landfills.

Appliances dropped at the e-waste site are collected and dismantled for retrieval of valuable components and removal of hazardous materials.

The new 300m sq Anglesea e-waste depot is open 9am to 4pm every day except Christmas Day.



WAR MEMORIAL: A community appeal raising money for a new memorial in central Anglesea has reached about one-third of its \$65,000 target.

Anglesea and District War Memorial Committee is co-ordinating the project and seeking nominations of people to be listed on the memorial plaques.

ANGLESEA ART HOUSE SCULPTURES: Two metal fish sculptures gifted to the Surf Coast Shire community following the 2006 Commonwealth Games will become features in a newly landscaped entrance to the Art House.

The Fijian clown trigger fish and South African galjoen, now mounted on Art House walls, will be anchored to recycled timber power poles in garden beds at the car park entrance.

The Art House initiated the \$12,750 project via Council's Community Project Development Program and received \$5000 from Council's Small Grants Program.

Work is scheduled to be completed during February and March and the sculptures, both several metres long, will be retouched to original colours once they are relocated.



ELLIMATTA RESERVE: Building of a new 32-bay car park beside the netball courts is complete, including sealing, line-marking, drainage and installation of bollards and a path.

The \$195,325 project was successful in the Victorian Government's Pick My Project community grants initiative and will be delivered on time and within budget, in partnership with the Anglesea Football Netball Club.

Preliminary work is now underway with the club planning concept designs for a new netball pavilion.

The reserve's existing netball pavilion needs to be improved to meet Netball Victoria facility standards, existing and future club needs.

Completing concept designs will mean the club will be poised to submit funding applications to state and federal governments.
