

# Winter Flowers of Anglesea & Aireys Inlet

## Common Heath

*Epacris impressa*

Erect or spreading shrub to 1m, with crowded short, prickly, pointed, tapering leaves. Masses of tubular white, pink, or red flowers. The pale-pink form is the Victorian state emblem.

**Anglesea: A, D, E | Aireys Inlet: N**



## Sweet Wattle

*Acacia suaveolens*

Open shrub to 2m with widely-spaced, long narrow, phyllodes (modified leaves) with a prominent midrib. Creamy-yellow, globular, fragrant flower-heads clustered along the branchlets.

**Anglesea: A, C, D, E | Aireys Inlet: N**



## Common Correa

*Correa reflexa*

Erect or spreading shrub to 1.5 m.

Leaves are variable, narrow dark-green, and lightly hairy on the upper surface, and light-brown and densely hairy beneath. Tubular red, or sometimes green, flowers with a green tip.

## Early Nancy

*Wurmbea dioica* subsp. *dioica*

Small slender plant to 15cm, with three long narrow linear leaves at the base. One to seven white, star-shaped flowers with three petals, and three very similar-looking sepals, and a broad band of purple towards the centre. Male and female flowers are on separate plants, the female with a central purple ovary, and the male with a ring of six pale stamens.

**Anglesea: A, C, F**



## Climbing Sundew

*Drosera macrantha* subsp. *macrantha*

Delicate scrambling/climbing plant to 1m. The leaves are modified into cup-like discs, edged with radiating hairs glistening with secretions that trap and digest insects. Terminal clusters of large white or pink, sweetly perfumed, five-petalled flowers.

**Anglesea: B, C, D, E**



## Small-leaved Clematis

*Clematis microphylla*

Slender straggling climber trailing through vegetation up to 5m. Dull green, narrow leaflets arranged in three groups of three. The male and female flowers on separate plants, with masses of creamy, starry flowers with four petal-like sepals. The male plants have a number of short, spreading stamens.

**Anglesea: C | Aireys Inlet: K, L**



## Red Ironbark

*Eucalyptus tricarpa*

Tall tree to 30m with distinctive thick, dark, hard furrowed bark over the whole trunk and branches. Lance-shaped leaves to 15cm. The drooping creamy-white, and sometimes pale-pink, flowers are in clusters of three and fallen flowers may carpet the ground under the tree.

**Aireys Inlet: M**



## Nodding Greenhood

*Pterostylis nutans*

This orchid forms large colonies of rounded, nodding translucent, green hooded flowers to 30 cm. The plant has a rosette of four or five large leaves forming a rosette, and two or three stem-hugging bracts.

**Anglesea: C, D, E | Aireys Inlet: N**



## Leopard Orchid

*Diuris pardina*

Slender orchid to 35cm with two or three grass-like leaves. Each stem has three to six yellow flowers with distinctive brownish spots. The two stalked upright petals are more spotted on the reverse surface.

**Anglesea: E | Aireys Inlet: N**



## Small Spider Orchid

*Caladenia parva*

Small pale-flowered greencomb spider orchid to 1.5cm. Hairy stem with one broad, long, hairy leaf at the base. Single spider-like flowers with a crimson stripe down the middle of each petal and sepal. Short darker green 'comb' on either side of the protruding cream and green labellum that has a deep maroon tip.

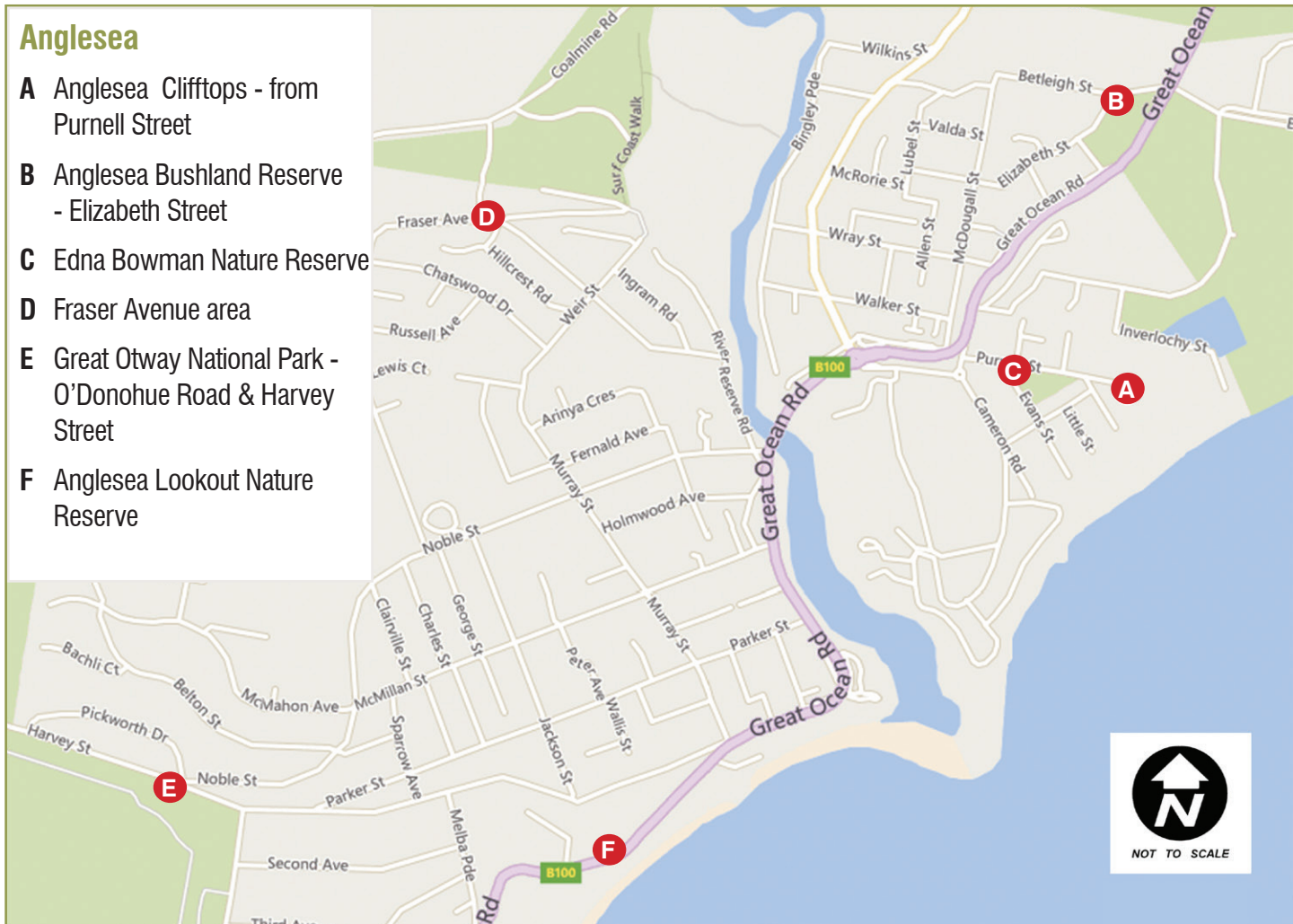
