

Early Years Services – QA6.4 - Central Registration and Enrolment Scheme

TRIM Reference: D23/84589

Purpose

This policy outlines the allocation of kindergarten places by Surf Coast Shire Council's Central Registration and Enrolment Scheme (CRES) to ensure equitable access to kindergarten for all families.

Policy Principles

This policy assists Surf Coast Shire Council's commitment to deliver a consistent, transparent and accountable process for allocation of kindergarten placements.

Scope

This policy applies to all families accessing three- and four-year-old kindergarten programs for the following services and includes kindergarten providers and council officers involved in the administration of Council's CRES:

- Anglesea Kindergarten
- Helen M Kininmonth Kindergarten
- Jan Juc Preschool
- Kurrabee Myaring Kindergarten
- Lorne Kindergarten
- Torquay Kindergarten

Policy

Surf Coast Shire Council's CRES works in partnership with kindergarten services and oversees the allocation of places in three- and four-year-old kindergarten programs. The CRES supports the Best Practice recommendations endorsed by the Department of Education (DE) and the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) to provide a fair and transparent process for allocating kindergarten placements within each service. Each service has an individual priority of access to allocate placements.

Priority of Access

Surf Coast Shire Council supports the Victorian State Government policy directions which articulate children in the following priority groups benefit most from being involved in early childhood programs. Families that provide evidence where possible that they have a child in one of these categories will be allocated as a priority.

Kindergarten Priority Groups – This includes 3-year-old and 4year-old programs

Tier 1

- Children at risk of abuse or neglect, including children in Out-of-Home Care
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander children
- Asylum seeker and refugee children
- Children and/or families holding concession cards
- Children from families with multiple births

- Children and or families with additional needs who require additional assistance to fully participate in the kindergarten program
- Children requiring a second year of 3 or 4-year-old kindergarten, approved by the Department of Education (DE).

Tier 2

- Children currently attending the service

Tier 3

- Children who have had a sibling attend the same kindergarten in the last 3 years
- Children who will be 3 turning 4 in their first year of attendance
- Surf Coast Shire residents
- Residential proximity

In mixed-age groups, the Priority of Access guidelines equally prioritise 3-year-old and 4-year-old children considered vulnerable under the policy.

Three-year-old kindergarten - Government Funded Program

Children must be three years old to attend Three-Year-Old Kindergarten.

Children accessing Three-Year-Old Kindergarten will transition to Four-Year-Old Kindergarten the following year, unless assessed as being eligible for a second year of Three-Year-Old Kindergarten (when a child shows delays in at least two key outcomes of learning and development as assessed by your child's kindergarten teacher).

Families with children born between January and April are strongly recommended to consider the best time for their child to access Three-Year-Old kindergarten, as this will impact on their one year of Four-Year-Old kindergarten and their school starting age.

Early Start Kindergarten (ESK)

Early Start Kindergarten gives eligible children 15 hours of free kindergarten a week. To be eligible, your child must be three by 30 April in the year they start kindergarten, and:

- is from a refugee or asylum seeker background, or
- identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, or
- your family has had contact with child protection

Children enrolled in Early Start Kindergarten are also eligible for [Pre-Prep](#) (more hours of Four-Year-Old Kindergarten) the following year.

Attendance for 2-year-olds in the Kindergarten Program

Children under three will not be able to attend a funded kindergarten program until their third birthday due to ratio requirements.

Four-year-old kindergarten - Government Funded Program

Children must be four years old by 30 April in the year they are attending kindergarten to be eligible.

Children will only be able to access one year of Government Funded Four-Year-Old Kindergarten and will transition to school the following year, unless assessed as being eligible for a second year of Four-Year-Old Kindergarten (when a child shows delays in at least two key outcomes of learning and development as assessed by your child's kindergarten teacher).

Going to kindergarten if your child is 6 years old

Children who turn six at any time during the kindergarten year need to be exempt from attending school. Parents/guardians must obtain an approved exemption before their child starts kindergarten by submitting an exemption from school form to the Department of Education. Exemption from school forms can be found at www.education.vic.gov.au

You are required to provide a copy of your child's exemption from school form prior to confirming enrolment.

Pre-prep

From 2025, four-year-old kindergarten will gradually transition to pre-prep, with programs across Victoria increasing from 15 to 30 hours each week.

Led by qualified teachers, pre-prep will give four-year-old children greater opportunities to socialise and learn through play. Pre-prep will be delivered through standalone (sessional) kindergartens and long-day care centres.

By 2036, all children across Victoria will have access to 1,800 hours of funded kindergarten before school, including 600 hours of three-year-old kindergarten and 1,200 hours of pre-prep.

Both pre-prep and three-year-old kindergarten are part of the Free Kindergarten program.

Pre-prep priority of access

From 2026 Pre-prep priority of access gives eligible children between 16-25 hours of free kindergarten per week. To be eligible, your child must be four by 30 April in the year they start kindergarten, and:

- is from a refugee or asylum seeker background, or
- identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, or
- your family has had contact with child protection.

From 2028, an additional priority of access will include children:

- who have (or have a parent or guardian who has) a Commonwealth concession card
- from a multiple birth (triplets or more)

This will enable children to access between 16 and 25 hours per week across Surf Coast Shire. This will increase to between 16 and 30 hours per week by 2030.

When to start Three and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten

Use the Starting Age Calculator to enter your child's birth date to find out what year they can start Three and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten.

Registration

Applications for both Three and Four-Year-Old Kindergarten open in term 2 each year. (Refer to [Appendix A](#) for specific dates and timeline). The online application form is available via the Surf Coast Shire Council website, on the [Kindergarten page](#).

Families will receive a confirmation email upon receipt of application.

Fees

Surf Coast Shire Council offer 15 hours of free Three and Four-Year-Old kindergarten and between 16-25 hours of free kindergarten for Pre-prep priority children

If families attend more than one kindergarten or long day care service, they must choose where their child will take part in the funded kindergarten program to receive the free kindergarten funding.

Any donations are voluntary and not required for participation in the kindergarten program.

No other fees will be charged except when additional hours at the kindergarten are provided. These hours will be additional to the 15 hours of free government funded kindergarten.

Accepting full fee-paying children

Surf Coast Shire Council will not accept full fee-paying children in a funded kindergarten program. Only in exceptional circumstances may your request be considered. This request must be in writing.

Allocations

- Children will be allocated placements according to the priority of access for each service.
- Families will be emailed their group placement at the end of round one (Refer to [Appendix A](#) for specific dates and timeline). If a family chooses not to accept the position allocated, they can opt to be placed on a waiting list for a different session.
- If unsuccessful in gaining a place, the application will remain on the waitlist.
- A waiting list will be maintained for families who didn't receive a placement in the first round and will be offered any vacancies before round two applications are allocated.
- Round two applications will be processed after round one placements have been confirmed. (Refer to [Appendix A](#) for specific dates and timeline).

Enrolments

- Families will be emailed the enrolment form to complete after accepting their group offer. (Refer to [Appendix A](#) for specific dates and timeline).
- Families are required to:
 - Complete all documentation required by the service.
 - Provide any required authorisations, such as for the approved provider, nominated supervisor or an educator to seek medical treatment for the child from a registered medical practitioner, hospital or ambulance service and, if required, transportation by an ambulance service.
 - Notify the service upon enrolment of any specific health care needs of the child, including any medical conditions and allergies and any medical management plans that need to be followed.
 - Ensure all information about the child and family held by the service is kept up to date, including any parenting plans or court orders.
 - Provide at least two authorised nominees prior to commencing at the service.
 - A current Immunisation History Statement must be provided to access all early childhood education and care services in Victoria as per the ['No Jab, No Play' law](#).

[No Jab, No Play](#)

The 'No Jab, No Play' legislation aims to reduce the risk of vaccine-preventable diseases through increased immunisation rates in the community.

The legislation requires all children enrolling in early childhood education and care services to be up to date with their vaccinations or to meet the criteria for exemption at the point of enrolment.

Services can obtain an up-to-date immunisation status from families up to two months prior to the first day of attendance at kindergarten in order to confirm kindergarten enrolment.

Prior to confirming enrolment, service providers must obtain evidence that the child:

- is fully vaccinated for their age (via an immunisation status certificate), or
- is immunised in accordance with a recognised catch-up schedule if the child has fallen behind with their vaccinations, or
- has a medical reason not to be vaccinated.

Service providers:

- may give eligible children experiencing vulnerability and disadvantages a 16 week support period to produce proof of up-to-date immunisation.
- should provide information and assistance to families about the immunisation process.
- must keep immunisation documentation with the child's enrolment record in accordance with the applicable regulations.

Definitions

Enrolment	An enrolment occurs when the provider has an arrangement with an individual or organisation to provide education and care to a child.
Support Period	Allows specific categories of children of families experiencing vulnerability and disadvantage to enrol and attend the service without an AIR Immunisation History Statement or when the statement is assessed as not being up to date. The 16-week support period starts on the first day of the child's attendance at the service. During the support period, the service is required to take reasonable steps to obtain the AIR Immunisation History Statement and to encourage families to access immunisation services.
Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) Immunisation History Statement	The only form of acceptable evidence of immunisation. The AIR is a national register administered by Medicare that records all vaccinations given in Australia, including to children. Parents/carers must provide a copy of their most recent AIR Immunisation History Statement, which shows that the child is up to date with their immunisations upon enrolment and when a child has received or been due to receive a vaccination while attending the service. In the case of medical contraindication, an authorised medical practitioner completes and signs a Medical Exemption Form and supplies it to the AIR. To confirm enrolment, the Immunisation History Statement must show the child is up to date with the vaccines they can have medical contraindication and indicate the due date for the next vaccinations the child is able to receive in the future if applicable.
